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# City, Fairmont West HOA Agree to Lease of Park

On May 13, La Porte City Council voted 7-2 to authorize city staff to enter into an agreement with Fairmont Park West HOA for the lease of swim-

ming pool and park space at

Fairmont Park West, from June 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019, enough time to allow a master plan study for all city parks to be completed.

Currently, the Fairmont Park West park has been closed due to safety concerns.

According to city documents, on October 1, 1978, the City entered into a 40-year agreement with the Fairmont Park

# Voters Decide La Porte, Shoreacres Races

Residents in La Porte and Shoreacres went to the polls on Saturday, May 4 to decide the direction for their cities.

For the City of La Porte At-Large A position, Brandon Lunsford defeated three-term incumbent John Zemanek, receiving 548 votes (52.0 percent) to Zemanek's 506 votes (48.0 percent).

For District 4, Thomas Garza defeated Marc Clarke, receiving 193 votes (71.2 percent) to Clarke's 78 votes (28.8 percent).

For District 5, Jay Martin won re-election, receiving 263 votes (88.3 percent) to Chuck Rosa's

35 votes (11.7 percent).

Lunsford and Garza were sworn in at the May 13 La Porte City Council meeting. Jay Martin will be sworn in at the June 10 meeting.

For the City of Shoreacres, Bo Bunker (79 votes), Jerome McKown (79 votes), and Felicia Ramos (78 votes) won the three available Alderman-at-Large positions up for election, receiving the three highest vote counts.

Ron Hoskins received only 16 votes.

Bunker, McKown, and Ramos were sworn in at the May 13 City Council meeting.



#### **Pedestrian Dies After Collision**

A pedestrian died May 4 from injuries sustained after being struck by a vehicle on Spencer Highway.

At 8:38 p.m., first responders arrived to the 9100 block of Spencer Highway where a pedestrian was struck while crossing the road.

The pedestrian, an adult white male, stepped out into the roadway without observing traffic first, and failed to yield right of way.

The vehicle was eastbound and hit the victim.

The driver immediately stopped and attempted to administer aid.

A number of witnesses to the event advised officers the pedestrian was at fault and the driver could not have avoided striking him.

The victim was transported to an area hospital where he was declared deceased on arrival. Sobriety tests were administered to the driver. who was extremely cooperative with police.

#### HazMat Crew Collision

On May 8, 2019, at approximately 9:08 a.m., several 18-wheelers crashed into each other on the northbound side of Highway 146 just north of Wharton Weems, diverting all traffic to the service road.

HazMat crews were concerned with acrylic acid as the load in one tanker.

Fire and HazMat crews responded and roadway was reopened after mitigation.





# Dow Chemical Co. Locks Out Texas Workers

On April 22, Rohm and Haas Texas Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Dow Chemical Co., made the decision to lock out more than 200 workers at its plant in Deer Park.

The members of United Steelworkers (USW) Local 13-1 have been working to bargain a new contract with Rohm and Haas for the past several weeks.

The union and the company had been operating under a 24-hour rolling extension of the current collective bargaining agreement while negotiations on a new contract continued.

Dow Chemical Co. informed the union the week before that it would lock the workers out if they could not reach a deal by the 2 p.m. April 22 deadline.

For the USW, a sticking point in the negotiations has been the issue of overtime and possible

safety and fatigue concerns as a result of understaffing.

The company's proposed contract terms have been rejected twice by the

workers at the Dow plant.

In the first proposal, 96 percent of the

members rejected the company's offer.

The second proposal was rejected by 98 percent.

Dow and USW officials have met several times with a federal mediator in an attempt to restart negotiations.

When Dow bought

Rohm and Haas in 2009, the company acquired the 900-acre Deer Park site.

The plant primarily makes chemicals used in the production of plastics.

The La Porte Police Department is excited to announce the arrival of their fifth K9 Team, Edo and his handler Officer Christopher Cargile. Edo's arrival comes as the department celebrates ten years of successful K9 programs since May of

Edo is a 1 ½ year old Malinois X 8 and imported to the United States from Budapest, Hungary. The Malinois X is a hybrid cross breed between

the German Shepherd (good natured and have the general disposition) and the Belgian Malinois (extreme good health). The Malinois X breed is extremely smart in their training and respond very quickly to the training.

Edo's partner, Officer Cargile, is a two year veteran with the La Porte Police Department and is a graduate of College of the Mainland Police Academy. Officer Cargile earned a Bachelor of Science in Business with a concentration in Entrepreneurship from Sterling College, Sterling, Kansas.

The team just finished their training and graduated with high marks from the Houston K9 Academy, a four-week course. The K9 team is certified through National Narcotic Detector Dog Association (NNDA) on five narcotic odors including Marijuana, Cocaine, Methamphetamines, Heroin, and MDMA(ecstasy). Training also includes cash-related proceeds, to include many stolen or illegally possessed weapons.

This K9 Team was established so quickly due to a generous donation by Beacon Federal Credit Union of La Porte. Additional funding for this K9 team is through the department's utilization of seized drug monies and K9OFFICERS.ORG.

West Community Improvement Association (HOA) for the lease/rent of the park and swimming pool property located at Oakmont Drive, Rustic Gate Road, and Cedarmont Drive in the Fairmont Park West subdivision. The HOA paid \$40 in advance (\$1 per year for the 40-year agreement) for the right to operate and maintain the park and pool property.

This agreement expired on September 30, 2018. According to the agreement, upon termination of the agreement "any permanent improvements erected on the leased premises by the HOA shall be the property of the City."

There were many discussions last year pertaining to the City assisting with costs to "get the swimming pool up and going for use" during the summer. The City Manager's Office and the Parks & Recreation Department provided assistance financially and with necessary staff to assist the HOA in

getting the swimming pool "up and running." During the city fiscal year 2018-19 budget process, City Council discussed several options moving forward concerning the Fairmont Park West park and swimming pool (demo pool, demo pool and build splash-pad, and enter into a new agreement with HOA). Ultimately, the Council gave staff direction to meet with the HOA and determine if a short-term extension to the agreement could be agreed upon.

The City Manager and HOA representative Mike Patterson met on several occasions over the past year to iron out what the short-term extension agreement would need to include. Several meetings ensued with HOA board members and Fairmont Park residents concerning the drafted agreement. After some modifications, the final agreement went before City Council on May 13.

According to the terms of the agreement, the swimming pool and park will only be open to residents of the Fairmont Park West HOA subdivision. The swimming pool will be operat-

ed as a Class C pool; therefore, no lifeguards and/or monitors are required. However, the HOA must make sure that the diving board has been removed and that the HOA meets all requirements required by the Administrative Code for Class C pools (i.e., signage, etc.). The HOA will be fully responsible for all cost associated with the maintenance and repairs of the swimming pool, park, grounds

and property. No City funding will be spent for the upkeep of this amenity; and the HOA will still be responsible for acquiring liability coverage in the amount of \$2 million dollars for each occurrence and \$4 million dollars in aggregate to cover any accidents occurring on leased property. This is the same coverage the City maintains for other City swimming pool facilities.

The HOA will be obligated to pay a rental/lease cost of \$1 during the term of the agreement

The term of the agreement is only for seven months, from June 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019, to allow time for the completion of a proposed master plan study for all city parks. When that study is complete, the long-term fate of the park will be re-visited.

better, but also his community.

We spoke to two such dads, a father and son, who have spent their lives in La Porte giving to their families and giving back to the community.

You may know this family

– Jay Martin and his son, Jeff
Martin – two fathers who have
dedicated their lives in servant-leadership.

Jay Martin began his life in La Porte early in the fourth grade when his family moved here because his dad was working for Houston Light & Power

Days then were much different than today; kids could roam the streets until the street lights came on before they were called home to dinner. Jay remembers playing basketball in his driveway, riding his bike to school, to the barbershop and all around town. Most of his friends from childhood are still good friends today – the kind of friends where the back door is always open and friends come and go without blinking an eye.

Jay's dad was always involved in the community, which showed him how to be a dad.

He was Jay's baseball coach, a member of Rotary, and a participated in the local Methodist church where Jay and his family still attend today. Both Jay and his wife graduated from La Porte high school, where his mother was a teacher and later his wife became a secretary to several superintendents.

The best thing about living in La Porte, according to Jay,

is that at the end of his day's work in Houston, he can come home to La Porte and never know he lives near a big city. In fact, he said, "Most people in Houston, didn't even know La Porte existed, which fit me

Living in this community enabled Jay to raise his own children much like he was raised, with sports, attending community events, engaging in the Methodist church, and building friendships that have lasted throughout the years.

perfectly!"

Jeff Martin, Jay's oldest son, remembers fondly his dad teaching him to play baseball.

According to Jeff, Jay had been a pretty good baseball player in his younger days. "Dad would sometimes get a little annoyed with us boys because we weren't quite on that same level, and would throw us curve balls just to throw us off guard," said Jeff. "One day, he threw a curve ball and hit my brother right in the mouth! Playing catch with my dad was a real experience!" They had to learn to catch curve balls and knuckle balls.

Every summer, Jay took his family on vacation to Port Aransas

They had a boat they would trailer down there and every year they had a problem with that boat. One year, it would only go in reverse, one year the wheel fell off the trailer, and one year, they had to stop in Bay City to buy new tires. According to Jay, the kids dreaded going on those vacations because they knew there was going to be a problem.

One of Jeff's favorite memories was when he turned 16, he begged his dad for a car.

He wanted a car with a clutch – a stick shift.

Jay found Jeff a used Honda Accord, took him out for a spin and parked it on the boat ramp at Sylvan Beach.

He then had Jeff take over the wheel. With laughter crinkling his eyes, Jeff recalls that he had no idea what he was doing and nearly, but not quite, flooded the car! He drove the car off the ramp and realized he did not know how to drive a stick shift.

Jeff was the son that pushed all the boundaries – he was the "learning curve" for Jay and his wife.

And after his brothers came along, Jeff became their protector and defender.

The ultimate big brother, who not only picked on his brothers, teased them and let them take the blame for his mishaps, he was their defender when anyone else would try to harm them.

Like any father and son, the guys had their differences, and after Jeff graduated from high school, he was expected to attend the University of Texas, following in his dad's and grandfather's footsteps. But being a strong-willed young man, Jeff visited the campus of Texas A&M and after one look, he became an Aggie! Jeff decided then, he would make his way in the big wide, world, and never, ever return to La Porte.

That lasted for a few short years, when an opportunity presented itself for Jeff to own his own business, and much like the prodigal son, he was welcomed home with open

Neither of these men really thought about becoming community leaders. Both of them fell into their respective roles, Jay, as city council member for district 5, and Jeff, as President of the La Porte-Bayshore Chamber of Commerce.

For Jay, his involvement into city governance began after his home was flooded during Hurricane Ike.

With more than two feet of water throughout the house, he had to deal with several different agencies, contractors, builders, and city offices. With this fresh, new knowledge, and with many other people who also were experiencing the same type of problems, he was encouraged by many of his friends to run for city council.

He kept telling them no until they wore him down, when he

finally said yes and became a council member in 2010 and again in 2019.

For Jeff, being involved, being a "servant-leader" is in our DNA. My dad learned from his father who learned from his father.

All of them were involved in Rotary, the Masons, and in the church.

"My dad showed me what being a servant leader is all about, and when I came home to La Porte, I became involved as well. It was ingrained in us, that we are to give back to our community. Seeing what my dad did, and what his dad did, those are the things that keep me here. This has been a "God" thing in my life, bringing me back here."

"What I really love about La Porte," said Jeff, "is that we are a small town but we have a big heart. When things happen, this town comes together in a big way."

And, with great pride in his voice, Jay told us that what he is most proud of is being Jeff's dad.

"When I meet people, I get to tell them, I am Jeff's dad and I wear that like a badge of honor. I am so proud to be his dad."

Watching this father and son's interaction, you could see their love and respect for each other.

Jeff is now raising his children in the manner in which he was raised.

He is teaching them the values handed down from his grandfather to his father.

He hopes that his kids grow up to be the type of man who taught him how to catch that curve ball, or that knuckle ball.

Becoming a good dad is like making fine wine.

It takes time.

It takes work.

And most of all it takes love

– a lifetime of love because
dads are in it for the long haul.

So, this Father's Day, let's celebrate all those dads who taught us how to play ball, ride a bike, drive a car, and how to become a servant-leader.





# June Fishing Report From Texas Parks & Wildlife

Following is the most recent weekly fishing report for the Texas Gulf Coast from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

#### **North Sabine**

Trout are fair to good in the middle of the lake over rafts of shad. Redfish are fair on jigs tipped with shrimp around marsh drains. Some birds have worked over trout.



#### East Matagorda Bay

to good for drifters on live shrimp over humps and scattered shell.
Redfish are fair to good around slicks on live shrimp.

#### **South Sabine**

Sheepshead and black drum are good at the jetty on live shrimp. Trout are fair to good around Lighthouse Cove and around the jetty rocks on topwaters. Redfish are fair to good in the marsh on topwaters.

#### **Bolivar**

Trout are fair to good on the south shoreline on soft plastics and plugs. Black drum and redfish are good at Rollover Pass. Croakers are good on dead shrimp in the channel and around the pass.

#### **Trinity Bay**

An inundation of freshwater from the Trinity River has made for tough fishing.



Trout are fair to good on the south shoreline on topwaters and soft plastics. Whiting and sand trout are good on the edge of the Intracoastal on fresh shrimp. Trout are good on mid—bay reefs on soft plastics and croakers.

#### **West Galveston Bay**

Trout are fair to good for drifters working shell on live shrimp. Trout, sheepshead, redfish and black drum are good at the jetty on shrimp. Kingfish, ling, red snapper and sharks are good offshore. Tides are 2–3 feet above normal

#### **Texas City**

Trout are good on reefs and wells on live bait. Sand trout are fair on fresh shrimp off the piers. Redfish are good on live bait in Moses Lake.


#### Freeport

Sand trout and sheepshead are good on live shrimp on the reefs. Trout and sand trout are good at the jetties

#### **West Matagorda Bay**

Redfish are fair to good on the edge of Oyster Lake on shrimp and crabs.

Trout are good on sand and grass on soft plastics and croakers.

Redfish are fair to good at East Flats on shrimp. Redfish and sheepshead are fair to good at the jetty on shrimp. Offshore is good for sharks, ling, red snapper and kingfish.

# We're Only Doing It for Your Own Good

eeing all the graduation photos on Facebook, watching parents celebrate little Johnny and/ or Suzy graduate from junior high to high school, from high school to college, I was reminded of my own college years and raising my own two sweet, wonderful, perfect (NOT) children! Keep in mind, I had to wait until the ex and the kids grew up and left home before I could hit those ivy-covered

But, as I walked those ivy-covered halls, bits and pieces of conversation struck out at me.

"I want my own apartment so I can get away from my mother!'

"Boy, I can't wait to get out of that house; my parents are driving me crazy!'

Well, of course we're driving you crazy. That was our job, or at least a hefty part of the job description. One of the major points of creative parenting ability is attention to details, minute details. For instance, the way you walk around the house, leaving a trail of bread crumbs, cookies, crackers and/ or popcorn for US to clean up – to say nothing of the shirts, socks and shoes we found draped over the television set, hung on the door frames or thrown on top of the refriger-

Details are very meaningful in the parent-child relationship. They make communication an exciting, adventurous journey into a world of nuances, innuendoes, implications. and sometimes, albeit rarely from parents, distortions of the truth.

Distortions usually come in the form of reasons for:

- 1. Not coming home the same night you go out
- 2. Receiving a "D" in statistics class
- 3. Receiving a "W" in statistics class

Because parents are paying the bills, including tuition, strangely, we think we're entitled to:

- 1. An explanation
- 2. A rational justification
- 3. Complete enlightenment Parents also have the uncanny ability to hear and see certain actions and/or events, a significant ability upon which we are tested over and over many times.

Think you can whisper over the phone that tonight you're going to hit the bars with that "no good bum" we told you never to see again? Think again – we heard that! The driveway will be blocked with an Army tank so you can't get your car out. We're nailing the doors shut from the outside. We just contacted the local steel company to install bars on all the windows. And, in case he comes here, we've installed a hot wire around the entire yard.

As you head out the door to study with your best friend at the "library," your purse/ backpack has suddenly become transparent. Is that a pack of cigarettes? And, after all our lectures on the dangers of smoking. Those aren't my new earrings, are they? The ones I just bought last week? What else do I spy in that backpack? ARE THOSE CONCERT TICKETS? LIBRARY??

Well, now you're going to get it. You're on the receiving end of the second most important ability parents must possess – THE LECTURE. We can and do talk on any given subject with the expertise of a professional speaker, the clarity of an English professor, the passion of a televangelist, and the resonance of a trumpet. (I personally received very high marks in resonance.)

Parents also come equipped with a high degree of curiosity, argued by some to be the most essential element of parenting. Here's the way it works: If we want to know something about our child, what they are saying, what they are doing, who they are seeing, we simply follow them. We check out their drawers at home, call up their friends, go to the school, talk to their teachers and sometimes, we have even been known to sit in on their classes.

This is not called snooping, spying or interfering, we merely are keeping up with what our children are doing. I, personally, belonged to all the clubs – the booster club, PTA, room mothers' clubs, teachers' helpers, volunteer office help, and any other group I thought would help me keep spy.... er.... I mean keep an eye on my kids.

Included in the realm of curiosity is the presumption that your rooms are our rooms – at least according to the parenting manual I read, specifically giving me, the parent, the duty to inspect said living quarters of the above-mentioned children. (The house note is in who's name??)

We parents have an awesome responsibility raising our children. We feel it is our duty, our life's work, to make sure that everything we do is with their best interests in mind.

So, why on earth would they want privacy when they can take advantage of all our parenting skills? Why would they want to move in with strangers who aren't like us? After all, we're only doing it for their own good.

PS: Back when my kids were teens, cell phones with GPS trackers were not even on the horizon. Had I been able to track them with a tracking program, my life would have been so much easier (and more fun) – I could have followed them everywhere – all the time!!





#### Houston Places First in the US During Annual Global City Nature Challenge

Citizen Scientists in the Greater Houston and Galveston area competed in the Third Annual City Nature Challenge held in Houston, Texas and won first place on May 13th in the United States for most species identified during April 26-29, 2019. The Houston participants identified 3,367 species of flora and fauna from backyards to city parks to wildlife refuges and sanctuaries. The city took third place globally with Cape Town and

Hong Kong coming in first and second respectively.

During the City Nature Challenge, cities around the world compete to see which urban area has the most nature and the most engaged residents by posting observations on iNaturalist, an online Citizen Science effort to document species. This year's City Nature Challenge included 159 cities around the world with almost one million observations recorded.

# Judy Moody & the Not Bummer Summer: The Thrill Points Race



# Ryan Schoppe Wins Gold Again

La Porte High School junior Ryan Schoppe added another gold medal to his collection of state titles on May 11 in Austin and joined an exclusive club in the process.

In winning the 3,200-meter run in 8:52.73, Schoppe joined the sub-9 minute club for the two-mile event. His time was not only 11 seconds faster than his state-qualifying — and thenstate best 9:03, which he ran at the April 27 regional meet, he also eclipsed his personal best and was two seconds off the state record.

Not to mention, Schoppe's time in the 3,200 is the 12th fastest in the nation.

"I have never seen a high school athlete run a negative split the way he did in the 3,200," head track coach Zach Johnson said. "His first mile was 4:35 and second mile was 4:17 with a 58-second last lap. That was unreal."

In one of the closest races of the meet, Schoppe grabbed the state runner-up position in the 1,600-meter run, finishing a mere six-tenths of a second behind the winner, at 4:07.47. His time was the fifth-fastest in the U.S. for 2019.

"The 1,600 race was just as exciting," Johnson said. "While he may not have won the race, he definitely made it what it was. He led from start to almost finish, which is exceptionally surprising given that they had already raced earlier that day."

In the same event at the 2018 state meet, Schoppe placed eighth with a 4:27.28.
